





Lest We Forget...

## PLANNING THE CONVENT BUILDING



In November, in an attempt to answer how our convent got here, the focus fell on the purchase of the surrounding properties and discovering who Theresa (Fessler) Maurer was. Once the land was purchased, finding someone to design and facilitate the construction was next instituted. In a brief history of our community, our foundress wrote: *"It was decided to have an architect draw up the plans for a plain but substantial building which could be added to as needed... An architect, Adolphus Druiding from Chicago was asked for advice. When he came and looked the place over he was delighted with it. He then was asked to draft a plan."* He was hired in late 1871 or early 1872. Eventually he would also help with the construction of the 1879, and 1890 constructions. It is impossible to take a picture of the original drawing /blueprint of the five stories he planned that included the east, north and west wings. Here is a sample of the first floor. Note cistern circle, and staircase on lower left leading to "the cellar". Watch for the plans to be displayed in Heritage Display Room. They are fascinating drawings....but not what our building eventually turned out to be.



Adolphus Druiding was born in Hannover, Germany in 1839. Around 1866 he was in the United States as an architect and building superintendent. His specialty was religious architecture, in particular, vertical Gothic style. He was thought to have designed over 400 churches, convents and schools. St. Francis Xavier Cathedral in Green Bay and **St. Mary's Church** in Kaukauna are listed in his works. Druiding died February 19, 1899 in Chicago.

She emailed: The only way for the Vatican to have opened a case for his canonization was if the Diocese of Tucson had petitioned for his cause to be opened. So the response to his question is in his own backyard. He needs to check jurisdiction Yuma was in at time of the person's death to know where original records would be - - could be California, even Mexico. Email back to Fr. John Nahrgang who was very appreciative of the directive given.


