I've been very blessed to grow up in a vibrant faith filled family and church community at St. Elizabeth Ann Seton in Fryeburg, Maine. My parents have always been active in our church working with a variety of ministries like Chapel Ministries, RCIA, Pre -Cana, and Youth Ministry both at the parish and diocesan level. Growing up seeing how their stewardship strengthened their faith and family connections truly got me to become more engaged with my faith and relationship with Christ.

As I became more involved with our parish, teaching religious education, working with the acolytes and serving on the Parish Council aided me in learning about stewardship and the beauty that the Catholic Church has to offer us in tradition, culture and faith. During my formative years I was also blessed to have a Bishop who was engaged in having families and young adults understand the importance of the Catholic faith and using your God given gifts to work with others and evangelize our faith. He and the Director of Religious Education established the Maine Diocesan Catholic Council of High School Youth Ministry in which they provided a variety of retreats. One of the retreats that I was connected with was the GIFT retreat as a team leader. In this retreat, high school students had the opportunity to learn about the gifts and talents that God had given them and how to use these gifts in their church and hometown communities

The more involved I became in the variety of church ministries the more I felt a call to evangelization. After graduating from High School, I attended Franciscan University in Steubenville, Ohio. My goal was to obtain a teaching

degree and join a religious Community or missionary organization and work with children and families. While, at Franciscan University I had the opportunity to meet with a variety of religious Sisters and spend time with them. During these years I also became acquainted with museum work and in my senior year, I felt that God was calling me to investigate this line of work.

After graduation I started working with Colonial Williamsburg and other National Parks; it was during this employment that I had the opportunity to share my faith with others and form strong ecumenical relationships. I also, felt that something was missing, so I went to graduate school and obtained a degree in education and museum studies at New Mexico State University. During my years in school I worked closely with the Newman Center and local parishes

Once, I obtained my degree I continued to work with the National Park Service and forming ecumenical relationships with my colleagues and getting involved in the Catholic churches that I was attending. While being involved in these communities I kept feeling that God was calling me to something deeper and back to my root dream. When I moved to St. Louis for a National Park job at the Gateway Arch I became acquainted with the Secular Franciscan community and started attending their fraternity meetings and going through their formation program. I was also met Sister Delores Vogt and Sister Sue Ann Hall from your Community and spent time with them on my days off. The more time I spent with the Sisters the more I felt like I was somehow "home".

With the intensity of my job at the park, I became distracted from pursuing this calling. I left St. Louis and moved to Connecticut to work with the Navy at their Submarine Museum. While being employed with the Navy I had the opportunity to attend daily adoration and speak with a Spiritual Director, Sister Ann Marie Lom, who solidified that God was calling me into a deeper relationship with him. With her assistance I filled out the application for the Franciscan Sisters of Christian Charity and a year later I am here part of your Community.

Have no anxiety at all, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, make your requests known to God" (Phil 4:6-7).

The Catechism reminds us that, every need can become the object of petition (No. 2633). We should not be afraid to approach God to entrust him with our needs. Pope Francis leads us in tapping into prayers of petition that not only express needs of the Church and the world, but also reflect our faith in our God who provides. There is a story that paints a word-picture of this reality in faith. It goes like this.

A poorly dressed woman walked into a grocery store. She approached the owner humbly, asking if she might get a few groceries on credit, for her husband was very ill and they had seven children to feed. The grocer scoffed and asked her to leave.

Persistently she begged, 'Please, sir! I will pay just as soon as I can.' The owner refused. A customer overheard and offered to cover the cost for whatever she needed. Reluctantly the grocer agreed and asked for the woman's list. 'Put your grocery list on the scales and whatever your grocery list weighs, I will give you that amount in groceries," the owner slyly promised.

Bowing her head, the woman silently reached into her purse, took out a piece of paper and scribbled something on it. She then gently laid the paper on the scale.

The scale went down and stayed down. The waiting customer smiled as the befuddled grocer added more and more items on the other side of the scale. It would not balance, so he continued to put still more groceries on until the scale would hold no more.

The grocer stood there in utter disgust. Finally, he grabbed the piece of paper from the scales and saw not a grocery list, but a prayer, which said: 'Dear Lord, you know my needs and I am leaving this in your hands.'

Receiving her groceries gratefully the woman left while the other customer handed a fifty-dollar bill to the grocer saying; 'Only God knows the weight of a prayer.'

So, as we unite ourselves with the Holy Father in prayer each day and each month, let us also be a bridge that joins the many needs of our world with our generous God.

This month's intention reads, Let us pray for those people on the margins of society in subhuman living conditions, that they may not be neglected by institutions and never be cast out.

Many of Pope Francis' intentions, like this one, relate directly to the area of social justice. Attention to and the care of the marginalized is certainly relative to life in a healthy society and also calls us to weigh the demands of justice which should apply equally to all. Yet, as the story above illustrates, social justice and particularly care of those in need also relates directly to our life of prayer.

Perhaps we are not on the front lines of actively caring for the poor and neglected, yet we still bear responsibility to do what our capabilities allow. We can seek out information to keep our minds informed as to the plight of those living in subhuman conditions, those on the margins. We can seek information about organizations whose mission is to gather in such poor ones and tend to their lack. We can bring the fruit of our explorations into our conversations in Community and beyond. We need not preach, but we can inspire and enlighten.

Resources that are frequently endorsed for information on the marginalized and Church response to them include Catholic Relief Services and Catholic Campaign for Human Development. These continue to be excellent places to seek information. As we continue participating in the synodal process, you may also wish to check this link: Three Ways to Listen on the Margins.pdf (usccb.org)

Herein you will find a discussion of three questions to consider. 1.) Ask "who is not around the table"? Whose voice is not present or might be left out? 2.) How can we go out to such groups to ensure their participation in the living Church? 3.) What are some groups that we can partner with in reaching out to those that are forgotten? In the same vein, what are groups that I can support by my prayer?

Let us close with a promise to reflect on the words of Pope Francis in a homily from February, 2015: There are two ways of thinking and of having faith: we can fear to lose the saved and we can want to save the lost. Even today it can happen that we stand at the cross-roads of these two ways of thinking.

Let us stand at that intersection and pray that the saved will serve and the lost will rejoice in the invitation to be heard.



# 2023 Education Meeting July 6, 2023 Declaration on Christian Education

Eighty Sisters participated in the Education Meeting this summer. The tables in the cafeteria were arranged for groups of 8. Prior to the meeting the Sisters were given a copy of the *Declaration on Christian Education* from Vatican II. There were also study guide questions shared with the Sisters as they prepared for the meeting. The diagram above represents the bulletin board that Sister Mariella Erdmann made and hung in the cafeteria that day.

The meeting began with prayer followed by welcoming remarks from Sister Natalie Binversie. Each participant received a paper with statistics about Catholic Schools over the past 100 years. In 1920 there were more Catholic Schools and students than today! Sister Jane Kinate spent a few minutes explaining the differences among the three types of documents that flowed out of Vatican II. Since the document chosen for the meeting is classified as a Declaration, that means it contains the principles or beliefs of the Church on that topic. In other words, it is like the outline and not the final paper.

The *Declaration on Christian Education* lists 12 principles that define the Catholic Church's belief for education. There would not have been time to discuss all twelve of the principles so three were chosen for the afternoon. They were: #1 – The Meaning of the Universal Right to an Education; #3 – The Authors of Education; and #6 – The Duties and Rights of Parents. The discussion to the first principle was

summarized by completing the expression "Educate to –. Each group's response was attached to the bulletin board. This activity led to very animated discussions on the other two points. Time did not allow us to hear the summaries from each group's discussion. A collation of these discussions was sent out to the whole Community.

Another very pertinent question was discussed that afternoon. Where are the Franciscan Sisters of Christian Charity relative to education today? The collation paper includes the responses from the discussion groups. There are many and varied ways we continue to impact education. We do much for education outside the traditional school setting.

Remember Education is "Not Just a School Thing!"

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# Our Sisters at Tucson Steubenville West Conference

Sister Martha Mary Carpenter and Sister Pamela Catherine Peasel witnessed at the Steubenville West Conference held in Tucson, Arizona. We share Sister Martha's reflections on the weekend.

What a SPIRIT-FILLED experience.

This was a weekend of GROWTH for all: Our teenagers experienced an 'expanded' view of the Church and saw hundreds and hundreds of their peers enthusiastically living, owning, sharing and celebrating the basic facts of our faith: that GOD LOVES US, and in His LOVE, HE FORGIVES US, and finally that HE IS ALWAYS WITH US, He will never leave us alone!

Our teens were 'shocked' at the number of young people who came up to us and would always say, "We have never seen REAL Sisters before!

We were delighted to see our teens ranging from 13-17... soaking it all in, joining in activities, singing and praying with the crowd and getting out of their comfort zones and getting to know other people!!

On *Friday, July 14th, the Feast of St. Kateri Tekakwitha,* 15 teenagers from all corners of the [Gila River] Reservation, three Franciscan Friars (a Deacon, Novice, Postulant), our 'vocation director' and bus driver, Fabian Terry and his assistant, Waylon Hooke and the two of us [Sister Martha Mary and Sister Pamela Catherine] headed down to Tucson for the Steubenville-West Conference...attended by over 1800 teenagers from throughout the United Sates—even Hawaii.!

The Conference was JESUS-filled and therefore JOY-FUL! Every moment of the Conference was organized and accounted for and the kids were exposed and taught various prayer forms, sang their hearts out, celebrated the presence of God, and got to know one another.

Saturday, July 15th-The Feast of St. Bonaventure...The theme of the Conference was REFUGE...GOD IS OUR REFUGE! The keynote speaker, main Mass celebrant, leader of nightly Adoration was Fr. Mike Schmitz! He was inspiring, motivating, challenging, delightful, and lots of fun.

Of the almost 2000 people present, there were only 3 Sisters...the two of us and Sister Mary Patrick from Nigeria who is missioned in a city school in New Mexico. Be-



cause of this, we were stopped many times by young people who have never seen a REAL Sister. We were asked many questions, and several young ladies even asked 'how to become a Sister' and told us that they really wanted to be a Sister.

Many asked to take pictures with us, we were interviewed often etc. Our teens were 'shocked' at the number of young people who came up to us and engage in conversation or prayer or ask us to pray for them.

On the last day, Sunday, July 16th, toward the end of Mass, Fr. Mike asked ALL the Sisters to come to the stage...and we were seated at the very back of the conference center....so Fr. Mike teased us a lot on the way up to the stage.

Upon our arrival on the stage, Fr. Mike introduced us and gave a beautiful vocation talk that had people in tears... then the Bishop of Tucson spoke of vocations and thanked us for our vocation and our service to the Church.

Fr. Mike then asked all the young ladies who wanted to be Sisters....and over 100 young ladies came forward in front of the stage...and some were crying happy tears. Fr. Mike and the Bishop prayed over them and asked all present to remember these beautiful young ladies in their prayers that they would have the courage to nurture their vocation and follow Jesus more closely.

The Good Samaritan School of Nursing closed in 1975 after flourishing for 70 years. Since its closing, the Nurses' Alumni have gathered every year for updates, fellowship and a meal. At this year's gathering (48 years after the School closed!) 79 nurses were present! They came from as far away as Texas. The oldest one present was 91, and they still keep in contact with a 101-year-old and a 102-year-old nurse. The relationships these nurses have forged with each other are strong and built on their bond of faith.
