Bapchule St. Peter Mission Adds High School

As the saying goes, "All good things take time." Ten years to be exact. Back in 2013, Bishop Olmsted of the Phoenix Diocese proposed, in casual conversation, if St. Peter would ever consider beginning a high school. One that would broaden the world of the students, opening new doors and placing them on a pathway to success. At that time, it only seemed a dream, however, with the help of the Franciscan Friars of the Holy Spirit and the graces of God, the high school is now a reality.



In 2015, Bishop Olmsted asked the Friars to conduct a study to gauge the feasibility of a Catholic High School on the reservation. The Friars worked with Cana Institute and the back work was off to a start. The study covered a number of areas including input from the families on the reservation, input from current students, possible building sites and a well drawn out four-year curriculum. This study became the framework from which the high school took shape.

As Sister Pamela Catherine was working towards an administration degree through Arizona State University the tangible pieces of the high school began to come together beginning with an Action Plan detailing the structure of the school, a proposed budget for the first year and another in looking ahead at a building project. Much time was spent in gathering together the finer details in order to present this plan to the Diocese, the Tribe and our Community. In August of 2022, the newly installed Bishop Dolan, visited the Mission and gave his blessing for the opening of the high school in the fall of 2023. During this past summer, the Action Plan evolved into a reality with the ordering of books and uniforms, the hiring of teachers, the gathering of classroom furniture, the preparation for temporary classroom usage and the gathering of various materials needed for each of the courses.



The school structure is three tiered. The first tier consists of traditional high school academics following a block schedule format with 70-

minute class periods. The second tier consists of Career Technical Education (CTE). Three CTE classes are being offered this first year and include Auto Mechanics, Cabinet Making, and Culinary. There is a possible fourth class in the making, Graphic Design. The third tier begins during the sophomore year and consists of an internship program similar to the Christo Rey model. Partnerships have been established with the Boys and Girls Club of Mesa, AZ and also with the Tribe to provide paid internships for the students. Stipends will be used to pay for the students' education.

This first year, we opened with the freshmen class of 15 students. We began the year reflecting upon the Parable of the Mustard Seed with our small beginning placing our trust in God's hands to continue to guide us as we grow. There have been numerous times when we didn't think something possible and God has

opened a door each time. He truly is in charge of this endeavor. We have also reflected upon the fact that St. Peter Mission began 100 years ago with only 12

students and we marvel at the growth God has provided.

His niece, Kaylin, teaches Career Explorations and Culinary while his nephew, Aram Coleman, who currently serves our country in the U.S. Army Reserves, teaches USMA and assists in the PE class. We have nicknamed the mission; Terry Town as Fabian's mom works in the office and another niece is a teacher aide. This family defines dedication.

We are hoping to break ground for the high school in October and recently had a very uplifting meeting with East Valley Institute of Technology (EVIT), the cream-of-the-crop of CTE schools in Arizona who would like to partner

with us and create an EVIT campus on our school grounds. This will not only serve our students, but also those in the surrounding area which includes, Chandler students, Casa Grande, Maricopa and Ak Chin. Again, God is very busy and at work. Our students will be bussed to their Mesa campus over the next few years until we have the facility here on the Mission grounds for EVIT to function as a school. CTE will take place in the morning and academics in the afternoon.



We want to thank all of you for your prayers and support as we continue to grow and expand. Your prayers are truly felt and our students are benefiting greatly. We thank our many benefactors who have supported the school both financially and with their prayers. National Day of Prayer for Victims of Abortion

On September 9th, a very solemn and prayerful group of *Nebraskans Embracing Life* gathered around a beautiful statue of *Rachel Weeping* to remember babies either aborted or miscarried and to solemnly resolve to never rest until every unborn baby is guaranteed the right to see the light of day.

I was privileged to address the audience on the life and legacy of Benjamin B. Ferencz, the last surviving prosecutor of the Nuremberg trials, who died recently at the age of 103. The legacy he bequeaths us is rich. First, as chief prosecutor for the Einsatzgruppen trial and, second, for his selfless dedication to establishing the International Criminal Court guaranteeing anyone committing international atrocities—like those of the Nazi regime—would be brought to justice.

In his last public address at the Cath-

olic University of America shortly before he died, it felt like Benjamin B. Ferencz was speaking directly to all who champion the rights of the unborn. "We are looking for human rights," he insisted, "and no one is to be treated as sub-human, or unworthy of being saved. We are trying to advance the principle that all human beings are entitled to be treated as human beings. If we can contribute to that, we should. If we cannot contribute to that, if we believe we ought to be superior people,

and that we can treat other people as inferior, then we have our own conscience to deal with. I hope you will finally decide to show that you are believers in equal rights for all people regardless of their race or religion or anything else. And that's what I hope you will stand for."

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JUST Gospel!

Did you know that October 1-7 is Junk Mail Awareness Week? Junk mail, Spam and all of those "nuisance" types of communication usually prove worthy of being ignored rather than being attended to. Pope Francis' intention for this month leads in a different direction. He calls for attentiveness in the form of listening and dialogue. The intention reads: Let us pray for the Church, that she may adopt listening and dialogue as a style of life at every level, allowing herself to be guided by the Holy Spirit towards the world's peripheries.

Marilyn Nelson, in her poem Generous Listening, writes:

A conversation can be a contest, or a game of catch with invisible balloons... Out of gray matter a star spark of thought leaps between synapses into the air, and pours through gray matter, into my heart: how can I not listen generously?

The dictionary defines listening very simply. Listening is to give one's attention to a sound.

We see this definition in action when the Prophet Elijah recognizes God in the sound of the gentle breeze as well as when those gathered in the upper room hear the noise like a strong driving wind and are then filled with the Spirit. We also note that in both of these accounts of Scriptural sounds, they are attended to and then acted upon. The poet Alice Duer Miller writes: You can listen like a blank wall or like a splendid auditorium where every sound comes back fuller and richer.

It seems that Pope Francis desires us to be the listener who acts on what is heard and who echoes back the sound in tones that are fuller and richer for our having absorbed the message. In a blog on listening, William Clemens states, to listen is to see the beauty and worth in another and embrace this by joining another in his or her own life's journey, wherever they may be, in whatever they are going through. St. John Vianney teaches us that listening can save lives. Regardless of how small a conversation may be, to listen is to embrace another, to shine forth that spirit of community that builds the foundation for the One, Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic Church. Each and every person has something to say and is worth the time.

As the pope announced the current synod on synodality he reminded us that it is all about listening—such that, for many, the question becomes, "But to whom? Someone has to speak!" The Holy

Father answers this question when he says that the Holy Spirit is the protagonist of the synod. He goes on to say that, *faith is born from listening, and is strengthened by proclamation*. Thus, we hear that prayerful listening to the Spirit is a first requirement. Then we are to act on what we've heard from the Holy Spirit as well as from other listeners. Such action is as important as the listening.

In an article entitled *The Joy of Listening and Walking Together*, Geevarghese Kaithavana reminds us, *Synodality is not a new concept. In fact, the call for listening and dialogue is not the innovation of Pope Francis. It is not a new way of doing things in the Church. Listening was the practice of the Early Church. Whenever there was a problem, the leaders convoked the entire community and they listened to all of the faithful.).* You may be interested in taking a deeper look at this entire article by checking out this link.

In another homily, Pope Francis asks, *In the Church, are we good at listening? How good is the hearing of our heart? Let us not soundproof our hearts.* This notion of sensitive listening particularly applies to any intersections we experience with those on the peripheries. Though we may not have occasion to listen directly to the poor, the immigrant, the refugee, the prisoner, or the addict we can keep ourselves current and knowledgeable about the needs of such groups so that our hearts will not become soundproofed in regard to their plight

Jessica Powers, in her poem *To Live With the Spirit*, captures in beautiful language a sense of what Pope Francis desires in the Church community. In part, the poem says,

To live with the Spirit of God is to be a listener.

It is to keep the vigil of mystery,
earthless and still.

One leans to catch the stirring of the Spirit,
strange as the wind's will.

The soul that walks where the wind of the Spirit blows
turns like a wandering weather-vane toward love.

Let us make such soulful listening a way of life in this time of the Synod. VOLUME 57 ISSUE 8 Page 7
